Patina - the coloring of metals that is caused by exposure to the elements

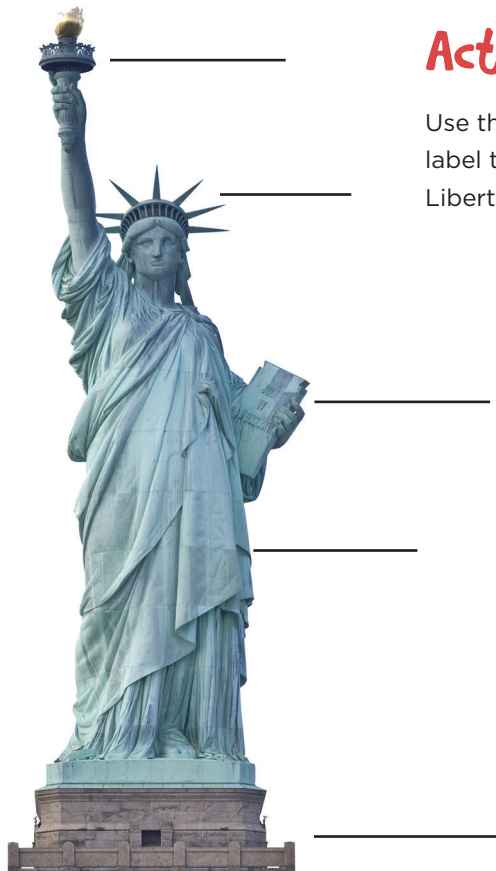
Pedestal - the base or support where a statue or structure is mounted
